## Joane Pickett - a Hope-Net Piggy Bank partner





The store highlights modern and contemporary items presented in an antique setting. She sees the store as serving the neighborhood with an added personal touch toward her customers.

Joane's connection with Hope-Net has evolved over the years, beginning with her attendance at many of the Taste of Larchmont events. She always had a good time and appreciated Hope-Net's role in fulfilling a valuable need in the community. Months ago, she picked up the mantle of distributing Hope-Net piggy banks. As Joane sees it, it's "giving back to the community" by helping those in our area in need. She has placed piggy banks in each of the classes at St. Brendan School and sees it not only as a way to raise Hope-Net funds but as a way for the children to understand the importance of giving back. She says that she wants them "to give some of their own money, not their parents', to use their ice cream or allowance money" to help others less fortunate. Pickett Fences has had its own piggy bank firmly affixed to its counter for many months and has been filled and emptied frequently. Joane adds: "People have been very generous because they know it supports something very valuable."

Already over 350 little banks have been distributed to businesses, schools and individuals throughout the community. The idea is to use "your change to make a change." Put your loose change (or bills) into the piggy and when full, give us a call and we'll come empty it for you. The small, clear "little porker" has inscribed on its side: "Hope-Net ...because none of our neighbors should go hungry."

## Executive Director Report

Being involved on a daily basis with the food needs of our low income neighbors, it is clear that the number of persons coming to our Hope-Net pantries and the amount of food distributed to provide them supplemental food assistance has grown significantly. Until this year, Hope-Net delivered two truck loads (using a 24 foot truck) filled with pallets of food bi-weekly. This year we began making this delivery weekly, and now we are delivering dry, nonperishable food twice weekly with each day involved two truck loads of pallets of food. To repeat, twice weekly we fill a 24 foot truck full of food twice and deliver the food to our Hope-Net pantries for distribution to clients. So, we know that the number of clients (households and persons) we are serving has grown as has the food we need to provide them.



Monthly Chart of Food Groups in lbs - 2008



### Food Pantries Plus!

At Hope-Net we try to address the varied needs of those who come to our pantries for food. For several years, Hope-Net has partnered with QueensCare to provide basic health services and has worked with Nurse Faye Russell to offer services as need and her schedule allows. Faye has scheduled fall flu shots at each Hope-Net food pantry throughout October and November. For example, on October 4, she distributed 81 flu shots to clients at Wilshire Boulevard Temple.

At First Unitarian food pantry, Rochelle McAdam and her team of volunteers hand out clothing, toys and household items each Saturday. As she says, "Anything that is donated. It all goes!" The congregation also provides social service referrals each week under their "Community Helpers" banner with members of the church talk to community members about their concerns.

Clothing is also distributed as supply allows at Wilshire Christian pantry and Immanuel Presbyterian pantry.
